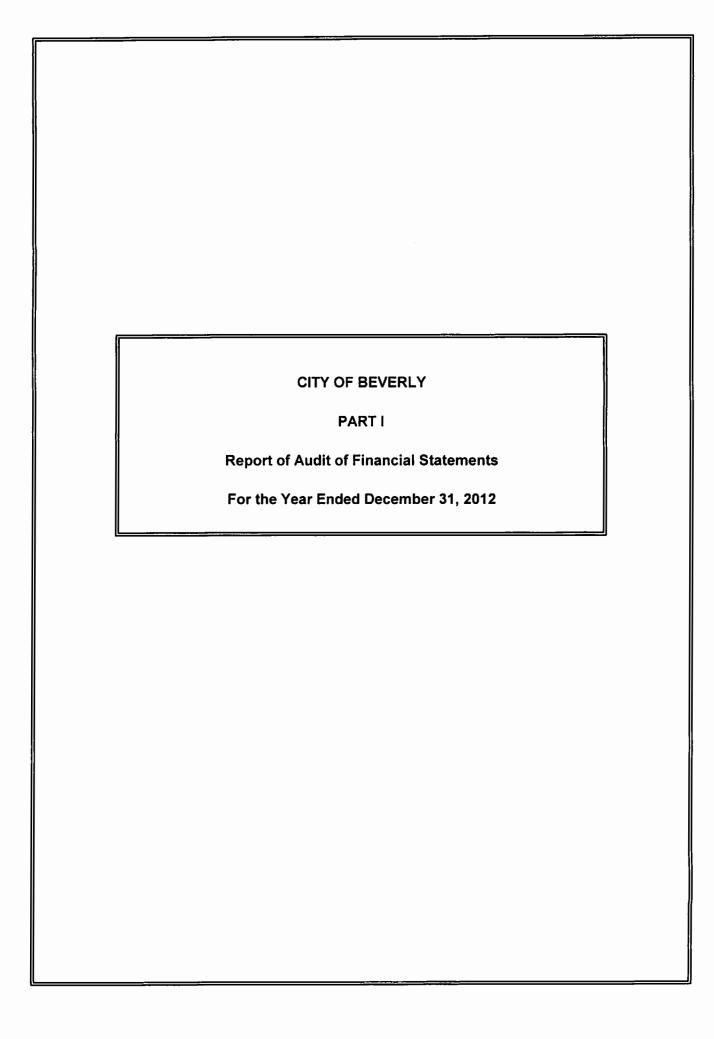

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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council City of Beverly County of Burlington Beverly, New Jersey

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying statements of assets, liabilities, reserves and fund balance - regulatory basis of the various funds of the City of Beverly, in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey, as of December 31, 2012 and 2011, and the related statements of operations and changes in fund balance - regulatory basis for the years then ended, and the related statement of revenues - regulatory basis, statement of expenditures - regulatory basis for the year ended December 31, 2012 and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the financial reporting provisions of the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and in compliance with audit requirements as prescribed by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the City's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the City's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles

As described in Note 1 of the financial statements, the financial statements are prepared by the City on the basis of the financial reporting provisions of the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, to meet the requirements of the State of New Jersey.

The effects on the financial statements of the variances between the regulatory basis of accounting described in Note 1 and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, although not reasonably determinable, are presumed to be material.

Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter discussed in the "Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles" paragraph, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the City of Beverly, in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey, as of December 31, 2012 and 2011, or the results of its operations and changes in fund balance for the years then ended.

Basis for Qualified Opinion on Regulatory Basis of Accounting

The financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group, as required by N.J.A.C. 5:30-5.6, because a record of general fixed assets was not maintained by the City. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

Qualified Opinion on Regulatory Basis of Accounting

In our opinion, except for the effect of the matter described in the "Basis for Qualified Opinion on Regulatory Basis of Accounting" paragraph, the financial statements referred to previously present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, reserves and fund balance - regulatory basis of the various funds of the City of Beverly, in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey, as of December 31, 2012 and 2011, and the results of its operations and changes in fund balance - regulatory basis of such funds for the years then ended, and the revenues - regulatory basis, expenditures - regulatory basis of the various funds, and general fixed assets, for the year ended December 31, 2012 in conformity with accounting principles and practices prescribed by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey as described in Note 1.

Other Information

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements. The supplemental financial statements presented for the various funds are presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey, and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The supplementary financial statements presented for the various funds are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information described in the previous paragraph is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated February 19, 2013 on our consideration of the City of Beverly's, in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey, internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the City of Beverly's internal control over financial reporting.

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REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING
AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF

WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council City of Beverly County of Burlington Beverly, New Jersey

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America: the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the audit requirements as prescribed by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey, the financial statements prepared on a regulatory basis of accounting prescribed by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey of the City of Beverly, in the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2012, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated February 19, 2013. In our report, our opinion was qualified because the financial statements did not include the general fixed assets account group as required by N.J.A.C. 5:30-5.6, Accounting for Governmental Fixed Assets.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the City of Beverly's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the City's internal control, Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the City of Beverly's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the City's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified. We did however identify the following deficiencies in internal control, described in the accompanying *Schedule of Findings and Recommendations* that we consider to be significant deficiencies. Findings no.: 2012-1, 2012-2, 2013-3 and 2012-4.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the City of Beverly's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards or audit requirements as prescribed by the Division of Local Governments Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey and which are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Recommendations as Findings no.: 2012-1, 2012-2, 2013-3 and 2012-4.

The City of Beverly's Response to Findings

The City of Beverly's response to the findings identified in our report is described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Recommendations. The City's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the City's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and audit requirements as prescribed by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersey in considering the City's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Description of Financial Reporting Entity - The City of Beverly (hereafter referred to as the "City") is located in the western portion of the County of Burlington, State of New Jersey. The present population according to the 2010 census is 2.572.

The City was incorporated in 1857 and is governed by a Mayor/Common Council form of government which consists of five members elected at large by the voters. Per the City of Beverly's Charter Amendment, Ordinance 2010-2, approved by the Governor of the State of New Jersey on January 14, 2010 beginning with the 2012 Municipal election, three persons shall be elected as members of the Common Council for "Transitional Terms" of five years. Thereafter, as terms expire, the Mayor and the members of the Common Council shall be elected for terms of four (4) years. The Mayor acts as the Chief Executive Officer of the City. The legislative powers rest with the Common Council. The City Administrator, City Chief Finance Officer and the City Clerk are appointed by the Common Council and monitor the daily administrative and financial responsibilities, including but not limited to, staffing and personnel issues and budget preparation and implementation.

Component Units — Criteria for determining if other entities are potential component units which should be reported within the City's basic financial statements are identified and described in the Governmental Accounting Standards Board's (GASB) Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards, Section 2100 and 2600. The application of these criteria provides for identification of any entities for which the City is financially accountable and other organizations that the nature and significance of their relationship with the City are such that exclusion would cause the City's basic financial statements to be misleading or incomplete.

Based on the application of these criteria, the following organization is considered to be a component unit; however, the City has determined that it is not significant and, therefore, has not been included in the basic financial statements:

Beverly City Sewerage Authority Municipal Building – Broad Street Beverly, NJ 08010

Requests for financial information should be addressed to the organization listed above.

Basis of Accounting, Measurement Focus and Basis of Presentation - The financial statements of the City contain all funds and account groups in accordance with the "Requirements of Audit" as promulgated by the State of New Jersey, Department of Community Affairs, Division of Local Government Services. The principles and practices established by the "Requirements" are designed primarily for determining compliance with legal provisions and budgetary restrictions and as a means of reporting on the stewardship of public officials with respect to public funds. Generally, the financial statements are presented using the flow of current financial resources measurement focus and modified accrual basis of accounting with minor exceptions as mandated by these "Requirements". In addition, the prescribed accounting principles previously referred to differ in certain respects from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America applicable to local government units. The more significant differences are explained in this Note.

In accordance with the "Requirements", the City accounts for its financial transactions through the use of separate funds which are described as follows.

Current Fund - The Current Fund accounts for resources and expenditures for governmental operations of a general nature, including Federal and State grant funds.

Trust Funds - The various Trust Funds account for receipts, custodianship and disbursement of funds in accordance with the purpose for which each reserve was created.

General Capital Fund - The General Capital Fund accounts for receipt and disbursement of funds for the acquisition of general capital facilities, other than those acquired in the Current Fund.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting - The City must adopt an annual budget for its current fund in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:4 et seq. N.J.S.A. 40A:4-5 requires the governing body to introduce and approve the annual municipal budget no later than February 10 of each year. At introduction, the governing body shall fix the time and place for a public hearing on the budget and must advertise the time and place at least ten days prior to the hearing in a newspaper published and circulating in the City. The public hearing must not be held less than twenty-eight days after the date the budget was introduced. After the hearing has been held, the governing body may, by majority vote, adopt the budget or may amend the budget in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:4-9. Amendments to the adopted budgets, if any, are detailed in the statements of revenues and expenditures.

An extension of the statutory dates for introduction, approval and adoption of the municipal budget may be granted by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services, with the permission of the Local Finance Board.

Budgets are adopted on the same basis of accounting utilized for the preparation of the City's financial statements.

Cash, Cash Equivalents and Investments - Cash and cash equivalents, for all funds, include petty cash, change funds, cash on deposit with public depositories. All certificates of deposit are recorded as cash regardless of the date of maturity. Investments are stated at cost. Consequently, unrealized gain or loss on investments has not been recorded in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 31.

New Jersey municipal units are required by N.J.S.A. 40A:5-14 to deposit public funds in a bank or trust company having its place of business in the State of New Jersey and organized under the laws of the United States or of the State of New Jersey or in the New Jersey Cash Management Fund. N.J.S.A. 40A:5-15.1 provides a list of investments which may be purchased by New Jersey municipal units. In addition, other State statutes permit investments in obligations issued by local utilities and other state agencies.

N.J.S.A. 17:9-41 et seq. establishes the requirements for the security of deposits of governmental units. The statute requires that no governmental unit shall deposit public funds in a public depository unless such funds are secured in accordance with the Governmental Unit Deposit Protection Act ("GUDPA"), a multiple financial institutional collateral pool, which was enacted in 1970 to protect governmental units from a loss of funds on deposit with a failed banking institution in New Jersey. Public depositories include State or federally chartered banks, savings banks or associations located in or having a branch office in the State of New Jersey, the deposits of which are federally insured. All public depositories must pledge collateral, having a market value at least equal to five percent of the average daily balance of collected public funds, to secure the deposits of governmental units. If a public depository fails, the collateral it has pledged, plus the collateral of all other public depositories, is available to pay the amount of their deposits to the governmental units.

The cash management plan adopted by the City requires it to deposit funds in public depositories protected from loss under the provisions of the Act.

Interfunds - Interfund receivables and payables that arise from transactions between funds are recorded by all funds affected by such transactions in the period in which the transaction is executed. Interfund receivables in the Current Fund are recorded with offsetting reserves which are created by charges to operations. Income is recognized in the year the receivables are liquidated. Interfund receivables in the other funds are not offset by reserves.

Inventories of Supplies - The costs of inventories of supplies for all funds are recorded as expenditures at the time individual items are purchased. The costs of inventories are not included on the various statements of assets, liabilities, reserves and fund balances.

General Fixed Assets - Accounting for Governmental Fixed Assets, as required by N.J.A.C. 5:30-5.6, differs in certain respects from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. In accordance with the regulations, all local units, including municipalities, must maintain a general fixed assets reporting system that establishes and maintains a physical inventory of nonexpendable, tangible property as defined and limited by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-87 (Attachment B, Section 19), except that the useful life of such property is at least five years. The City has adopted a capitalization threshold of \$5,000 the maximum amount allowed by the Circular.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

General Fixed Assets (Cont'd) - Generally, assets are valued at historical cost; however, assets acquired prior to December 31, 1985 are valued at actual historical cost or estimated historical cost. Donated general fixed assets are recorded at their estimated fair market value on the acquisition date. Donated general fixed assets are recorded at their estimated fair market value on the acquisition date. Interest costs relative to the acquisition of general fixed assets are recorded as expenditures when paid. Public domain ("infrastructure") general fixed assets consisting of certain improvements, such as roads, bridges, curbs and gutters, streets and sidewalks and drainage systems are not capitalized. Expenditures for construction in progress are recorded in the Capital Funds until such time as the construction is completed and put into operation. The City is required to maintain a subsidiary ledger detailing fixed assets records to control additions, retirements and transfers of fixed assets. In addition, a Statement of General Fixed Assets, reflecting the activity for the year, must be included in the City's basic financial statements.

The regulations require that general fixed assets, whether constructed or acquired through purchase, grant or gift be included in the aforementioned inventory. In addition, property management standards must be maintained that includes accurate records indicating asset description, source, ownership, acquisition cost and date, the percentage of Federal participation (if any), and the location, use, and condition of the asset. Periodically, physical inventories must be taken and reconciled with these records. Lastly, all fixed assets must be adequately controlled to safeguard against loss, damage or theft. No depreciation of general fixed assets is recorded.

Foreclosed Property - Foreclosed property is recorded in the Current Fund at the assessed valuation when such property was acquired and is fully reserved. Ordinarily it is the intention of the municipality to resell foreclosed property in order to recover all or a portion of the delinquent taxes or assessments and to return the property to a taxpaying basis. For this reason the value of foreclosed property has not been included in the General Fixed Assets Account Group. If such property is converted to a municipal use, it will be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group.

Deferred Charges - The recognition of certain expenditures is deferred to future periods. These expenditures, or deferred charges, are generally overexpenditures of legally adopted budget appropriations or emergency appropriations made in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:4-46 et seq. Deferred charges are subsequently raised as items of appropriation in budgets of succeeding years.

Liens Sold for Other Governmental Units - Liens sold on behalf of other governmental units are not recorded on the records of the City until such liens are collected. Upon their collection, such liens are recorded as a liability due to the governmental unit net of the costs of the initial sale. The related costs of sale are recognized as revenue when received.

Fund Balance - Fund Balance included in the Current Fund represent amounts available for anticipation as revenue in future years' budgets, with certain restrictions.

Appropriation Reserves - Appropriation reserves covering unexpended appropriation balances are automatically created at year end and recorded as liabilities, except for amounts which may be canceled by the governing body. Appropriation reserves are available, until lapsed at the close of the succeeding year, to meet specific claims, commitments or contracts incurred during the preceding fiscal year. Lapsed appropriation reserves are recorded as income.

Compensated Absences and Postemployment Benefits - Compensated absences for vacation and sick leave are recorded and provided for in the annual budget in the year in which they are paid, on a pay-as-you-go basis. Likewise, no accrual is made for postemployment benefits, if any, which are also funded on a pay-as-you-go basis.

Revenues - Revenues are recorded when received in cash except for certain amounts which are due from other governmental units. Revenue from Federal and State grants are realized when anticipated as such in the City's budget. Receivables for property taxes are recorded with offsetting reserves on the statement of assets, liabilities reserves and fund balance of the City's Current Fund; accordingly, such amounts are not recorded as revenue until collected. Other amounts that are due the City which are susceptible to accrual are also recorded as receivables with offsetting reserves and recorded as revenue when received.

Property Tax Revenues - Property tax revenues are collected in quarterly installments due February 1, May 1, August 1, and November 1. The amount of tax levied includes not only the amount required in support of the City's annual budget, but also the amounts required in support of the budgets of the Beverly City School District, Beverly City Fire District, and the County of Burlington. Unpaid property taxes are subject to tax sale in accordance with the statutes.

NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

School Taxes - The City is responsible for levying, collecting and remitting school taxes for the Beverly City School District. Operations is charged for the full amount required to be raised from taxation to operate the local school district for the year.

County Taxes - The City is responsible for levying, collecting and remitting county taxes for the County of Burlington. Operations is charged for the amount due the County for the year, based upon the ratables required to be certified to the County Board of Taxation by January 10 of the current year. In addition, operations is charged for the County share of Added and Omitted Taxes certified to the County Board of Taxation by October 10 of the current year and due to be paid to the County by February 15 of the following year.

Fire District - The City is responsible for levying, collecting and remitting the fire district taxes to the Beverly City Fire District. Operations is charged for the full amount required to be raised from taxation to support the fire district for the year.

Reserve for Uncollected Taxes - The inclusion of the "Reserve for Uncollected Taxes" appropriation in the City's annual budget protects the City from taxes not paid currently. The Reserve, the minimum amount of which is determined on the percentage of collections experienced in the immediate preceding year, with certain exceptions, is required to provide assurance that cash collected in the current year will provide sufficient cash flow to meet expected obligations.

Expenditures - Expenditures are recorded on the "budgetary" basis of accounting. Generally expenditures are recorded when paid. However, for charges to amounts appropriated for "other expenses", an amount is encumbered through the issuance of a numerically controlled purchase order or when a contract is executed in accordance with N.J.A.C. 5:30-5.2. When encumbered charges are paid, the amount encumbered is simultaneously liquidated in its original amount. Outstanding encumbrances are offset by an account entitled "Reserve for Encumbrances". The reserve is classified as a cash liability under New Jersey municipal accounting. At December 31, this reserve represents the portion of appropriation reserves that has been encumbered and is subject to the same statutory provisions as appropriation reserves.

Appropriations for principal payments and interest payments on outstanding general capital bonds and notes are provided on the cash basis.

Long-Term Debt - Long-Term Debt, relative to the acquisition of capital assets, is recorded as a liability in the General Capital Fund. Where an improvement is a "local improvement", i.e. assessable upon completion, long-term debt associated with that portion of the cost of the improvement to be funded by assessments is transferred to the Trust Fund upon the confirmation of the assessments or when the improvement is fully and permanently funded.

Interest on Delinquent Taxes – It is the policy of the City to collect interest for the nonpayment of taxes or assessments on or before the date when they would become delinquent. The Tax Collector is authorized to charge eight percent (8%) per annum on the first \$1,500 of taxes becoming delinquent after due date and eighteen percent (18%) per annum on any amount of taxes in excess of \$1,500 becoming delinquent after the due date and if a delinquency is in excess of \$10,000 and remains in arrears beyond December 31st, an additional penalty of six percent (6%) shall be charged against the delinquency. There is a ten (10) day grace period.

Comparative Data – Comparative total data for the prior year have been presented in the accompanying statements of assets, liabilities, reserves and fund balance and statement of operations in order to provide an understanding of changes in the City's financial position. However, comparative (i.e., presentation of prior year totals by fund type) data have not been presented in the statement of revenues – regulatory basis and the statement of expenditures – regulatory basis since their inclusion would make the statements unduly complex and difficult to read.

NOTE 2. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Custodial Credit Risk Related to Deposits – Custodial credit risk refers to the risk that, in the event of a bank failure, the City's deposits may not be recovered. Although the City does not have a formal policy regarding custodial credit risk, N.J.S.A. 17:9-41 et seq. requires that governmental units shall deposit public funds in public depositories protected from loss under the provisions of the Governmental Unit Deposit Protection Unit. Under the Act, the first \$250,000 of governmental deposits in each insured depository is protected by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). Public funds owned by the municipality in excess of FDIC insured amounts are protected by GUDPA. However, GUDPA does not protect intermingled trust funds such as salary withholdings, bail funds, or funds that may pass to the municipality relative to the happening of a future condition. Such funds are shown as Uninsured and Uncollateralized in the schedule below.

NOTE 7. PENSION PLANS

Substantially all of the City's employees participate in one of the following pension plans which have been established by State statute, and are administered by the New Jersey Division of Pensions and Benefits (Division): the Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS), the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) or the Defined Contribution Retirement Program (DCRP). Each plan has a Board of Trustees that is primarily responsible for its administration. The Division issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained by writing to the State of New Jersey, Division of Pensions and Benefits. P.O. Box 295, Trenton, New Jersey, 08625-0295.

Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS)

The Public Employees' Retirement System was established in 1955. The PERS provides retirement, death and disability, and medical benefits to qualified members. Vesting and benefit provisions are established by N.J.S.A. 43:15A and 43:3B.

NOTE 7. PENSION PLANS (CONT'D)

The contribution requirements of plan members are determined by State statute. In accordance with Chapter 92 and Chapter 103, P.L. 2007, plan members are required to contribute 5.5% of their annual covered salary. Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 78 P.L. 2011, the active member contribution rate was increased to 6.5% plus an additional 1.0% phased-in over seven years beginning in the first year. The phase-in of the additional incremental member contribution amount will take place in July of each subsequent year. The State Treasurer has the right under the current law to make temporary reductions in member rates based on the existence of surplus pension assets in the retirement system; however, statute also requires the return to the normal rate when such surplus pension assets no longer exists.

The City is billed annually for its normal contribution plus any accrued liability. These contributions, equal to the required contributions are detailed below.

Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS)

The Police and Firemen's Retirement System was established in 1944. The PFRS provides retirement, death and disability, and medical benefits to qualified members. Vesting and benefit provisions are established by N.J.S.A. 43:16A and 43:3B.

The contribution requirements of plan members are determined by State statute. In accordance with Chapter 204, P.L. 1989, plan members enrolled in the PFRS are required to contribute 8.5% of their annual covered salary. Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 78 P.L. 2011, the active member contribution rate was increased to 10% in October, 2011. The State Treasurer has the right under the current law to make temporary reductions in member rates based on the existence of surplus pension assets in the retirement system; however, the statute also requires the return to the normal rate when such surplus pension assets no longer exist.

The City is billed annually for its normal contributions plus any accrued liability. These contributions, equal to the required contributions are detailed below.

Defined Contribution Retirement Program (DCRP)

The Defined Contribution Retirement Program was established in 2007, under the provisions of Chapter 92, P.L. 2007 and Chapter 103, P.L. 2007 (N.J.S.A.43:15C-1 et. seq), and expanded under the provisions of Chapter 89, P.L. 2008 and Chapter 1, P.L. 2010. The Defined Contribution Retirement Program Board oversees the DCRP, which is administered by Prudential Financial on behalf of the Divisions of Pensions and Benefits. The DCRP provides eligible members, and their beneficiaries, with a tax-sheltered, defined contribution retirement benefit, along with life insurance and disability coverage. Vesting and benefit provisions are established by N.J.S.A. 43:15C-1 et. seq.

NOTE 7. PENSION PLANS (CONT'D)

The contribution requirements of plan members are determined by State statute. In accordance with Chapter 92, P.L. 2007 and Chapter 103, P.L. 2007, plan members are required to contribute 5.5% of their annual covered salary. Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 78 P.L. 2011, the active member contribution rate was increased to 6.5% plus an additional 1.0% phased-in over seven years beginning in the first year. The phase-in of the additional incremental member contribution amount will take place in July of each subsequent year. The State Treasurer has the right under the current law to make temporary reductions in rates based on the existence of surplus pension assets in the retirement system; however, state statute also requires the return to the normal rate when such surplus pension assets no longer exist. The employee contributions along with the City's contribution for each pay period are transmitted to Prudential Financial not later than the fifth business day after the date on which the employee is paid for that pay period.

There were no City employees enrolled in the DCRP for the years ended December 31, 2012, 2011 and 2010.

Related Party Investments - The Division of Pensions and Benefits does not invest in securities issued by the City.

NOTE 8. OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS (OPEB)

The financial statements of the City are not prepared in accordance with Governmental Standards Board Statement No. 45. The following information is provided in accordance with the requirements of the Statement.

Plan Description – The City contributes to the State Health Benefits Program ("SHBP"), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit post-employment healthcare plan administered by the State of New Jersey Division of Pension and Benefits. SHBP was established in 1961 under N.J.S.A. 52:14-17.25 et seq. to provide health benefits to State employees, retirees, and their dependents. Rules governing the operation and administration of the program are found in Title 17, Chapter 9 of the New Jersey Administrative code. SHBP provides medical, prescription drugs, mental health/substance abuse, and Medicare Part B reimbursement to retirees and their covered dependents.

The SHBP was extended to employees, retirees, and dependents of participating local public employers in 1964. Local employers must adopt a resolution to participate in the SHBP. The City's defined benefit postemployment healthcare plan provides post employment health care benefits, at its cost, to certain retired employees. A City employee will receive paid health insurance benefits upon retirement from the City provided they 1) retire from the City with at least twenty-five years of service in the New Jersey Public Employees Retirement System, 2) retire from the City with at least twenty-five years of consecutive service with the City, and 3) at the time of retirement the employee is at least fifty-five years of age. Retirees will not be eligible to receive paid health coverage for their spouses or for their dependents.

The State Health Benefits Commission is the executive body established by statute to be responsible for the operation of the SHBP. The State of New Jersey Division of Pensions and Benefits issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for SHBP. That report may be obtained by writing to the State of New Jersey, Division of Pensions and Benefits, P.O. Box 295, Trenton, New Jersey 08625.

Participating employers are contractually required to contribute based on the amount of premiums attributable to their retirees. Post-retirement medical benefits under the plan have been funded on a pay-as-you-go basis since 1994. Prior to 1994, medical benefits were funded on an actuarial basis.

Contributions to pay for the health premiums of participating retirees in the SHBP are billed to the City on a monthly basis. The City funds these benefits on a pay-as-you-go basis and therefore does not record accrued expenses related to these benefits. During the year 2012, 2011 and 2010 there were one, one and none retired employees, respectively who received this benefit resulting in payments of \$27,212, \$21,519 and \$0 in related health care premiums.

NOTE 9. COMPENSATED ABSENCES

All full-time employees are entitled to fifteen paid sick leave days each year. All unused sick leave may be accumulated and carried forward to the subsequent year. Vacation days are earned based on years of service. Unused vacation days may not be carried forward to the subsequent year.

Upon retirement employees will be compensated on 50% of all accumulated sick days at their current rate with a maximum pay-out of \$7,500.00.

The City does not record accrued expenses related to compensated absences. However, it is estimated that, at December 31, 2012, accrued benefits for compensated absences are valued at \$63,863.

Actual payment for compensated absences occurs through the Current Fund budget at the time the employee terminates employment.

NOTE 10. DEFERRED COMPENSATION SALARY ACCOUNT

The City offers its employees a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457 and which have been approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services. The plan, available to all full time employees at their option, permits them to defer a portion of their salary to future years. The deferred compensation is not available to the participants until termination, retirement, death, or an unforeseeable emergency occurs.

Amounts deferred under Section 457 plans must be held in trust for the exclusive benefit of participating employees and not be accessible by the City or its creditors. Since the City does not have a fiduciary relationship with the Plan, the balances and activities of the Plan are not reported in the City's financial statements.

NOTE 11. JOINT INSURANCE POOL

The City is a member of the Professional Municipal Management Joint Insurance Fund. The Fund provides its members with the following coverage:

Public Employees Bond
Public Official Bonds
Business Automobile
Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability
Environmental Liability
Property Damage

Annual contributions to the Fund, including a reserve for contingencies, are payable in two installments and are based on actuarial assumptions determined by the Fund's actuary. The Commissioner of Insurance may order additional assessments to supplement the Fund's claim, loss retention or administrative accounts to assure the payment of the Fund's obligations.

The Fund publishes its own financial report which can be obtained by writing to: Professional Municipal Management JIF, 250 Pehle Avenue, Suite 701, Saddle Brook, New Jersey, 07663.

NOTE 12. NEW JERSEY UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION ISURANCE

The City has elected to fund its New Jersey Unemployment Compensation Insurance under the "Contributory Method". Under this plan, the City is required to annually appropriate funds to pay for the projected costs of contributions at a rate determined by the Commissioner of Labor. The expense for these benefits for the years ended December 31, 2012, 2011 and 2010 was \$4,417.80, \$4,678.71 and \$4,386.00 respectively.

NOTE 13. CAPITAL DEBT (CONT'D)

Bond Anticipation Notes Payable

The City issues bond anticipation notes to temporarily fund various capital projects prior to the issuance of serial bonds. The term of the Notes cannot exceed one year from the date of issuance, however the Notes may be renewed from time to time for a period not to exceed one year. Generally, such Notes must be paid no later than the first day of the fifth month following the close of the tenth fiscal year following the date of the original Notes. The State of New Jersey also prescribes that on or before the third anniversary date of the original Note a payment of an amount at least equal to the first legally payable installment of the bonds in anticipation of which such Notes were issued be paid or retired. A second and third legal installment must be paid if the Notes are to be renewed beyond the fourth and fifth anniversary date of the original issuance.

NOTE 15. CONTINGENCIES

The City participates in a number of state and federally assisted grant programs. The programs are subject to compliance audits under the single audit approach. Such audits could lead to requests for reimbursement by the grantor agency for expenditures disallowed under terms of the grants. Management believes that the amount from future audits, if any, would not be material.

NOTE 16. LITIGATION

The City is a defendant in several legal proceedings that are in various stages of litigation. Although the outcome of these lawsuits is not presently determinable, it is the opinion of the City's counsel and City's management that resolution of these matters will not have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of the City.

NOTE 17. REGIONAL CONTRIBUTION AGREEMENT

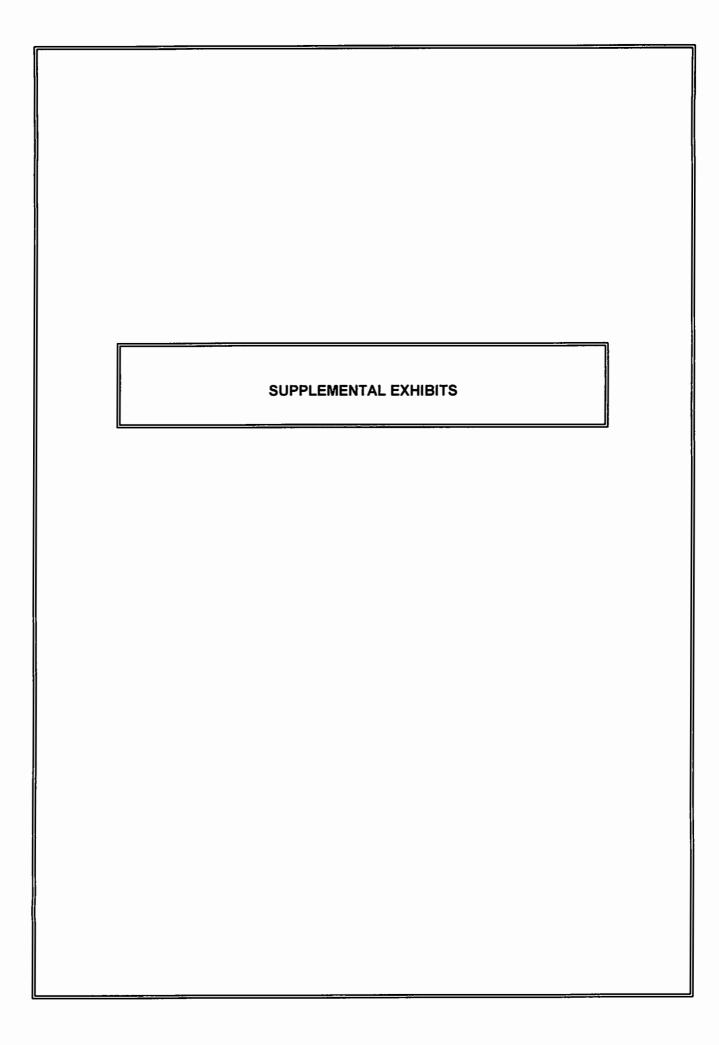
The Fair Housing Act, N.J.S.A. 52:27D-301 to 329, allows municipalities to enter into a contractual agreement, known as a regional contribution agreement, for transfer for up to 50% of a sending municipality's fair share obligation to a receiving municipality within its housing region. The City of Beverly has entered into an agreement with five other municipalities (sending municipalities) to transfer low and moderate-income housing units in accordance with the above stated statute. The sending municipalities paid a total of \$5,300,100 for their fair share obligation to the City of Beverly. At December 31, 2012 the City has unexpended funds held in trust for the regional contribution agreement in the amount of \$805,644.

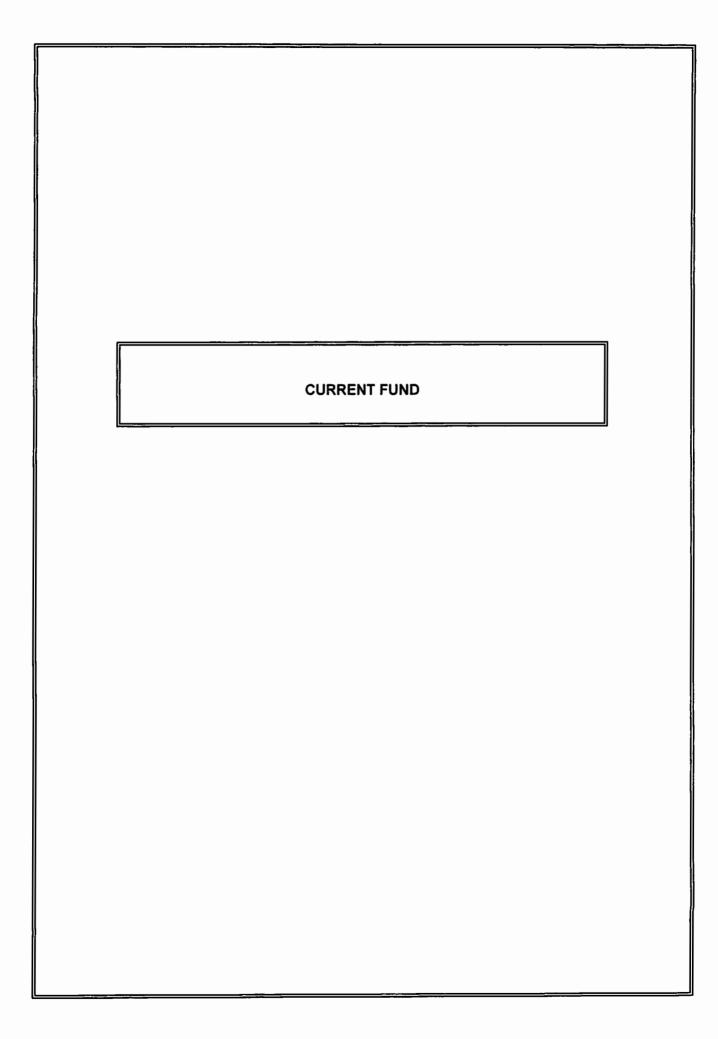

Schedule of Financial Statement Findings

This section identifies the significant deficiencies, material weaknesses, and instances of noncompliance related to the financial statements that are required to be reported in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and with requirements as prescribed by the Division of Local Government Services, Department of Community Affairs, State of New Jersev.

Finding #2012-1

Condition:

The City did not maintain a general fixed assets inventory in accordance with the N.J.A.C. 5:30-5.6 issued by the Division of Local Government Services.

Criteria:

N.J.A.C. 5:30-5.6 issued by the Division of Local Government Services, requires that all governmental units maintain a record of fixed assets on a current basis. The requirements include taking a physical inventory, valuing physical inventory, setting up property records, managing property and reporting fixed assets in the financial records.

Effect:

A lack of effective controls exists over the accounting for general fixed assets of the City.

Cause:

The City does not possess the necessary funds needed to establish and maintain a fixed asset accounting system and the time constraints on the existing staff level does not allow for the additional work required.

Recommendation:

A current record of general fixed assets should be developed and maintained to provide effective controls over City assets.

View of Responsible Official and Planned Corrective Action:

The responsible officials agree with the finding and will address the matter as part of the corrective action plan.

Finding #2012-2

Condition:

During the examination of the City payroll it was noted that seven (7) eligible employees were not enrolled in any of the three pension systems.

Criteria:

The State Division of Pensions requires that all eligible employees be enrolled in the appropriate pension system and that the proper base salary be reported.

Effect:

The City will be responsible for late enrollment fees.

Cause:

Oversight on part of the City officials.

Recommendation:

All eligible employees should be enrolled in the appropriate pension system and the proper amount of base wages should be reported.

View of Responsible Official and Planned Corrective Action:

The responsible officials agree with the finding and will address the matter as part of the corrective action plan.

Schedule of Financial Statement Findings (Cont'd)

Finding #2012-3

Condition:

The payroll bank account was not reconciled to the general ledger or the analysis of deductions payable during the year.

Criteria:

As a function of effective internal controls, an accurate payroll and payroll agency analysis must be maintained and reconciled to the general ledger and the bank balance to ensure that balances in the account and payments to the various agencies are for the correct amounts.

Context:

Payroll deductions payable activities were reviewed to determine if there were excess funds in the payroll account.

Effect:

Without an accurate analysis, there is an increased possibility that various overages and shortages in payroll deductions can go undetected and uncorrected. As a result, there appears to be excess unallocated funds.

Cause:

Time constraints with regards to the Chief Financial Officer's office.

Recommendation:

That the payroll bank account be reconciled to the general ledger and the analysis of payroll deductions payable on a monthly basis.

View of Responsible Official and Planned Corrective Action:

The responsible officials agree with the finding and will address the matter as part of their corrective action plan.

Finding #2012-4

Condition:

The minutes of the public meetings held by the governing body were not prepared and approved by the governing body on a timely basis.

Criteria:

P.L. 2001, c.404 known as the "Open Public Records Act" requires that government records be readily accessible for inspection, copying, or examination by the citizens of the State.

Effect:

The City has not complied with the "Open Public Records Act".

Cause:

Time constraints with regards to the City Clerk's office.

Recommendation:

The City Clerk should prepare, and the City Council should take formal action on, the minutes of the City Common Council meetings in a timely manner.

View of Responsible Official and Planned Corrective Action:

The responsible officials agree with the finding and will address the matter as part of the corrective action plan.

Finding #2011-2

Condition:

The City prepaid the 2012 Beverly City School District tax during calendar year 2011.

Current Status:

This condition has been corrected.

Finding #2011-3

Condition:

The payroll account has a negative reconciled bank balance of \$800.74 at December 31, 2011.

Current Status:

This condition remains unchanged as reported in Finding #2012-3.

Planned Corrective Action:

- Eight business registration certificates were not available for examination.

Condition:

There appear to be a number of tickets/special compliants assigned to police officers but not issued that are older than six (6) months.

Condition:
