Preparing Your Home for Spring—Preparing Your Town For Spring

Last month, we talked about getting our garden ready for spring. This month, we will focus on some things we can do to prepare our homes for spring. From the interiors of your home to the exterior, getting your home ready for spring will ensure you'll be ready to enjoy the warmer weather once it hits. Remember to space out your maintenance jobs and by the time spring is here, you'll be able to enjoy the season! Here are some suggestions from Freshome Design & Architecture on getting our homes ready for spring.

• Start on your exterior: The outside of your home has taken more wear and tear from the harsh winter, than the

interior so start here. Walk around your home and examine caulking around windows and doors, as well as open windows and doors and look at weather stripping. Replace old or cracking caulk and replace weather stripping. Inspect the roof for broken or missing shingles, or tiles, and clean out gutters and downspouts at the same time.

• Landscaping tips: While it may not be time for you to start planting flowers and watering your lawn, it isn't too early to ensure you will have your garden hoses, walkways, and adjacent areas to your landscaping ready. Replace cracked or old garden hoses, and rake away leaves, tree limbs and debris from

sidewalks, plant beds and surrounding areas. If you no longer have snow in your area, now is a good time to start planning out your spring landscaping ideas and lawn care maintenance regimen. Pressure wash concrete and paver areas that have become dirty and power wash vinyl siding, brick walls and vertical surfaces on your home if need be.

- Check your interior systems: The fall and spring are the two most important times to review your home's major HVAC heating, ventilation, air conditioning systems. Make sure air filters have been replaced or cleaned and stock up on new air filters if you use disposable one. Check your air conditioner before the summer to make sure it's in good working order. If you need to have a service person look at it now, it will be a lot less expensive than 3 months from now
- Interior spring cleaning: By now your windows, inside and out could use a cleaning. You will be surprised by how much you can see out your windows,

once they are cleaned. Clean off ceiling fans, and clean out fireplaces from use over the winter. Test your emergency systems in your home: home alarm, smoke fire alarm, fire extinguisher, and carbon monoxide alarms to make sue they are working properly. Most homeowners forget to test these regularly; fall and spring maintenance time is a perfect opportunity to ensure they're in good working order.

Preparing your home for the spring is rewarding now, and 3 months from now! Spring maintenance is a good idea for everyone, and even more important if you're considering putting your home on the market soon. Home buyers want to ensure that all systems have been well attended and taken care of before buying a home. If you're concerned you will miss something, hire a professional home inspector — they will cover the entire home from top to bottom! What are you waiting for? Get started......remember, spring is just around the corner!

Mosquito Control

It's spring and that means mosquito season is upon us. From April through November people in the county need to be proactive against the biting insects. The greatest threat from their painful bite is the West Nile Virus and about 36 people in Burlington County were diagnosed with the disease last year. According to the county 95 percent of the local mosquitoes are hatched in back yards in standing water. Female mosquitoes stay close to where they were born (in water), because they use that same standing water to lay their eggs after they bite you. If people are diligent and remove every ounce of standing water in their yards they can stop mosquitoes from hatching. Residents should:

- Get rid of any unnecessary items on your property that can hold stagnant water, such as old tires. Empty water from buckets, toys and containers, boats and canoes. Make sure your dry-docked boat's drain is open and is not holding water. Keep your canoes and kayaks stored upside-down.
- Drill holes in the bottoms of recycling bins and trash cans and keep containers covered.
- Drain (or treat with BT) birdbaths, fountains, wading pools, plant pots and drip trays twice a week.
- Clean out your gutters and fix gutters that sag or do not drain completely. Check for areas of standing water on flat roofs.
- If you have a swimming pool, outdoor sauna, or hot tub, make sure rainwater does not collect on the cover.
- Clear vegetation and trash from any drains (including curbside storm drains), culverts, ponds or streams on your property.
- Keep grass cut short and trim shrubs to minimize hiding places.

Attract mosquito eating birds to your yard by hanging suet now.

Complete control of mosquitoes results from removing water or treating it with biological products and horticultural oils. In ponds gambusia fish, bluegills, minnows and copepod crustaceans eat mosquito larvae. Some helpful products you can purchase include mosquito dunks or BTI a natural product that kills mosquito larvae in the form of Dunks or pellets can be placed anywhere that water tends to gather and is not harmful to birds or other wildlife. Some people believe non toxic products like Avon's

Skin So Soft and other natural oils keep the mosquitoes from

If spraying the air to try to repel or kill mosquitoes is required, there are highly effective non-toxic alternatives. They include garlic oil, cedar oil, mint oil, orange oil, and cinnamon – just to mention a few. There is extensive research on these products and techniques. If you see standing water in your neighborhood or in an abandoned yard notify city hall immediately.

Remember mosquitoes can hatch from a bottle cap of water. Keep your yard dry! Websites that can help are dirtdoctor. com and whyy.org/cms/youbetyourgarden.






